

The First Sunday in Lent March 9, 2025

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word.

(Ash Wednesday liturgy, Book of Common Prayer)

This Sunday, the Church is invited to continue in the observance of a holy Lent, which began a few days ago on Ash Wednesday. The main themes of Lent are repentance and journeying with Jesus toward the Cross--which is the only road to the Resurrection. In its focus on penitence, Lent has often been described as an opportunity to "acknowledge our wretchedness." Archbishop Thomas Cranmwer wrote that as part of the original Collect for Ash Wednesday in the 1549 Book of Common Prayer. Mirriam-Webster dictionary defines a wretch as "a miserable person," or "a base, despicable, or vile person."

Undeserved misery is a fact of life for many people, and probably most people have experienced misery at some point in their lives. Yet even in the midst of suffering, people find joy and purpose. Ash Wednesday's reminder of our mortality can prompt us to find meaning and fulfillment right now. Most of us, I think, are also acquainted with feeling despicable--I hope temporarily. At some point, have we not all hurt someone we love, whether intentionally or unintentionally? Lent is an opportunity to begin again, to be reminded that life is short, to turn from any harm we have caused for others or ourselves and turn toward the right path.

Turning toward the right path is at the core of Cranmer's exhortation to acknowledge our wretchedness. That acknowledgement is not saying that humanity is utterly depraved. That is not Anglican spirituality, nor is it the faith of the early church. The second century bishop Irenaeus, who helped define orthodoxy, wrote that "the glory of God is a living human being." Our humanity is blessed by God. The Old English, Old Saxon, and Old German words that gave birth to "wretch" meant "adventurer," "wanderer", "stranger," "exile," or "a "banished person." All these meanings derive from the root word "wrekan," which means "to pursue." So, the word wretch originally meant someone either in pursuit or who was being pursued, either an adventurer or an exile.

What if acknowledging our wretchedness means that pursuit is part of who we are as humans? What if being on a quest is central to our identity? That we are, by nature, wanderers. St. Augustine wrote that "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you." To be human is to be in search of the path back to Eden, to return to who we were created to be. Children of God, images reflecting the divine light of love. That is what we are searching for. We are searching not because God has exiled us, but because we too often lose our way and our identity, individually and collectively. We are exiles when we forget that the world we inhabit is sacred, and that so are we. May we, a wandering people, a searching people, find our home, and our true identity, in God's love.

Forum on LGBTQ+ Rights in 2025 - Today at 11:30am

After many years of victories for the LGBTQ+ community, new policies threaten to erode this hard-won progress. Transgender and non-binary individuals in particular have been the focus of many new discriminatory policies and much hateful rhetoric, but the changing landscape affects the entire LGBTQ+ community. The equality of all people is one of the values of the Episcopal Church, so we are concerned about these changes at the federal level, as well as some proposed in some municipalities and states. This is not a partisan issue, but a gospel one. Garden State Equality will lead us in a presentation and discussion of the political issues following the 10 am service and coffee hourtoday 11:30 am.

Episcopal Church's Public Policy Advocacy

Did you know that the Episcopal Church engages in public policy advocacy, guided by the values of our faith? The Episcopal Public Policy Network offers action alerts for members of our churches to stay informed and participate in the work of democracy. Several action items are available currently, including the Congressional budget process (the Church is concerned about possible budget cuts to Medicaid and other social programs), refugee admissions, foreign humanitarian aid, fighting HIV/AIDS, LGBTQ+ rights, the opioid epidemic, and several other areas. There, you can also use the online system to contact your elected officials and sign up to receive additional alerts.

This week, as we enter Lent and begin our journey with Jesus to the Cross, we highlight the need for humanitarian assistance in the land of Christ's birth. In particular, the people of Gaza need humanitarian aid, which this week has been cut off by the government of Israel.
