

The Second Sunday in Lent

March 16, 2025

Some Pharisees came and said to Jesus, "Get away from here, for Herod wants to kill you." He said to them, "Go and tell that fox for me, 'Listen, I am casting out demons and performing cures today and tomorrow, and on the third day I finish my work. (Luke 13:31-32)

I always loved Jesus' response here to the warning about the threat to his life: "Listen, I've got work to do. Can't you see that I'm busy? It's non-stop here. I'm casting out evil spirits and curing the sick right and left. Just move along. Thank you for your concern, but I'll be just fine. You can tell that scoundrel Herod that I've got better things to do today than worry about plots." Jesus gives us a model of how to best respond to those who seek to harm us or inspire fear in us: We have work to do. As Christians, we are co-workers with Christ in the divine mission of healing the world. We have people to love, people to serve, and people with whom we can be in solidarity. Meals need to be prepared and distributed, the Food Pantry needs stocking, and letters to public officials need writing. Prayers need to be said, the choir needs to rehearse, and parishioners need to be visited at home and the hospital. The best weapon against evil is goodness. Love, kindness, and compassion are stronger than darkness. The nineteenth century English novelist Edward Bulwer-Lytton said that the pen is mightier than the sword. So is the church.

The forces that opposed Jesus eventually won their battle. Jesus was arrested, tried, and executed. But they didn't win the war. Jesus rose to new life, and so did the movement he started. Love was stronger than hate. Life was stronger than death. And that is still true today.

Did you know that the Episcopal Church engages in public policy advocacy, guided by the values of our faith? The Episcopal Public Policy Network offers action alerts for members of our churches to stay informed and participate in the work of democracy. Several action items are available currently, including the Congressional budget process (the Church is concerned about possible budget cuts to Medicaid and other social programs), refugee admissions, foreign humanitarian aid, fighting HIV/AIDS, LGBTQ+ rights, the opioid epidemic, and several other areas.
